- <sup>10</sup> or the one who hears it may shame you and the charge against you will stand.
- <sup>11</sup>Like apples<sup>[b]</sup> of gold in settings of silver is a ruling rightly given.
- <sup>12</sup> Like an earring of gold or an ornament of fine gold
  - is the rebuke of a wise judge to a listening ear.
- <sup>13</sup> Like a snow-cooled drink at harvest time is a trustworthy messenger to the one who sends him;
  - he refreshes the spirit of his master.
- <sup>14</sup> Like clouds and wind without rain is one who boasts of gifts never given.
- <sup>15</sup> Through patience a ruler can be persuaded, and a gentle tongue can break a bone.
- <sup>16</sup> If you find honey, eat just enough too much of it, and you will vomit.
- <sup>17</sup> Seldom set foot in your neighbour's house too much of you, and they will hate you.
- <sup>18</sup> Like a club or a sword or a sharp arrow is one who gives false testimony against a neighbour.
- <sup>19</sup> Like a broken tooth or a lame foot is reliance on the unfaithful in a time of trouble.
- <sup>20</sup> Like one who takes away a garment on a cold day
  - or like vinegar poured on a wound, is one who sings songs to a heavy heart.
- <sup>21</sup> If your enemy is hungry, give him food to eat; if he is thirsty, give him water to drink.
- <sup>22</sup> In doing this, you will heap burning coals on his

head,
and the LORD will reward you.

- <sup>23</sup> Like a north wind that brings unexpected rain is a sly tongue which provokes a horrified look.
- <sup>24</sup> Better to live on a corner of the roof than share a house with a quarrelsome wife.
- <sup>25</sup> Like cold water to a weary soul is good news from a distant land.
- <sup>26</sup> Like a muddied spring or a polluted well are the righteous who give way to the wicked.
- <sup>27</sup> It is not good to eat too much honey, nor is it honourable to search out matters that are too deep.
- <sup>28</sup> Like a city whose walls are broken through is a person who lacks self-control.
